A Message from our Chair & Manager

2019 was another challenging year with a booming economy, several new staff hires, one resignation, continued program changes and new opportunities and funding challenges.

As we've come to expect, the members of the Board continue to provide excellent leadership and commitment to guiding the mission of the District. This is much appreciated by all of us on staff.

We kicked off the New Year with a New Website as Jennifer Risser and staff did an excellent job transitioning from the old one. While we bit into our years-long Ag Erosion & Sediment Control (E&S) and Conservation planning backlog, we continued to receive new requests for assistance at a steady pace. We were able to convince Gary Peacock to postpone retirement to help us address a looming Dirt, Gravel & Low Volume Road Program (DGLVR) deadline. This gave Emily Neideigh another year to tutor under Gary. We again received strong support from the Board of Commissioners. And, we posted the Engineer position for the Post Construction Stormwater Management (PCSM) Delegation but have not had success finding a candidate yet. Of the four new positions approved for 2019, we only added an engineering technician, as we wait to add two additional Ag planners, in order to determine our role in the Bay Watershed Implementation Plan (WIP III) and County-wide Action Plan (CAP) and soon to come Conservation Excellence Grant. We did fill an Ag Tech opening that we held for some time, when we found a candidate too good to pass on in Stephen Miller, who has met and exceeded our expectations. We now have a staff compliment of 23! Mark Kimmel spent a good deal of time with the County Open Space Protection Committee, which met with success when the Commissioners adopted a dedicated millage to be used to preserve open space. Yeah! And, we look to prepare for a move in early 2020 to newly renovated office space, at the Pleasant Valley Road County Departments Building, located only a few miles away. Thank you Commissioner Susan Byrnes and the Board of Commissioners for making this a reality! Meanwhile, we are deep into packing, purging and preparations for the move. YIKES! We keep telling ourselves, "change is good".

We look forward to welcoming two new Directors and six new Associate Directors to the 2020 Board, Both exciting and bittersweet as we say good-bye to long-time member Jeff Gossert and Commissioner Director Extraordinaire, Susan Byrnes. As we close out 2019, thank you to our tremendous Board and staff for another great year of service to the York County Community. We will continue to work to help make York County better than we found it, for the benefit of present and future generations. We hope we can count on you to partner and support natural resource stewardship and conservation of our great County.


The mission of the York County Conservation District is to protect and improve the natural resources of York County

Capital Resource Conservation and Development Area Council (RC&D)

The Capital RC&D Area Council builds partnerships of concerned citizens, businesses, agencies and organizations to work together improving the quality of life within the seven county area: Adams, Cumberland, Dauphin, Franklin, Lancaster, Lebanon and York. The District has three representatives serving on the RC&D board: Travis Sherman represents the District Board of Directors, and Patricia Devlin, Dillsburg, is an alternate member. Jim Myers, current part-time employee with the District, was appointed as member-at-large. Capital RC&D Council consists of volunteer representatives from local government, conservation districts, business, development organizations, nonprofit groups and individuals.

This council of 21 volunteers initiates and directs program activities. Projects are selected by evaluating local needs that promote conservation of our natural and community resources. The council provides the selected projects with necessary tools, such as technical expertise and assistance in locating funds. Resource Conservation & Development projects can focus on land conservation, water management, community improvements, alternative energy applications, recreation and tourism, forestry resources, recovery/recycling, rural economic development, as well as public information and education. We contracted with Capital RC&D to assist with the tillage survey in York County.

2019 Agricultural Conservation Program Accomplishments

- Wrote Ag E&S and conservation plans on 248 tracts covering 8,960 acres.
- Assisted two farm operations with the implementation of conservation practices that are funded with PPL Brunner Island and York County Community Foundation grants. Construction started in the fall but carrying over into 2020.
- Provided educational opportunities to farmers, cooperators, and the general public about the York County Conservation District ag program and manure management planning. Staff took displays and handouts to the following events: the York County Crops Day and the Ag Recognition Banquet sponsored by the Ag Business Council. Presentations were also done at the Jefferson Sportsman Association meeting, a Equine Pasture Walk hosted by Penn State Extension and the York County Ag Land Preservation Annual meeting.
- District staff published the third and final article in a series on Pasture Management in the spring edition of the District newsletter and one article on Managing Cover crops in the summer newsletter

- Provided support for the REAP program administered by the PA Dept. of Agriculture. Performed two Ag E&S and Manure Management plan verifications for program applicants.
- Continued to support the agreement with DEP and the York County Solid Waste and Refuse Authority to monitor the Land Application of Biosolids program. Assisted with the monitoring of farms for conservation compliance and reviewed Ag E&S/Conservation plans for permitted farms.
- Assisted the District Erosion and Sediment program staff with implementing the Agriculture Complaint Handling Guidelines. This includes Ag E&S and manure complaints, site visits, and plan reviews.
- Continued participation with PACD and NRCS on a Contributory agreement to support District ag staff. We completed the second full year of the agreement and earned \$48,730 for providing conservation planning and technical assistance.
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2019 Agricultural Conservation Program Accomplishments continued.

- The District improved assistance to the ag community by continuing to employ a part-time planner- Jim Myers and by adding a new employee in May- Stephen Miller.
- The Senior Ag Resource Conservationist continued to participate in the York County Bay County Action Plan implementation process.
- Ag Team incorporated the Practicekeeper program and database into our daily work routines. We are using the Nutrient Management module for program documentation and reporting and are starting to complete Ag E&S plans in the Planning module.
- Ag team member Michele Grove earned Public Review Nutrient Management Program certification and Stephen Miller started the certification training and process.
- Joe Rebert, Brita Runkle and Michele Grove continued training and gained experience as they work toward obtaining conservation planner certification from NRCS.
- The District applied for and was awarded an \$83,200 grant from NACD to provide conservation planning and technical assistance for NRCS federal program applicants and contracts.

2019 Nutrient Management Act Program

The York County Conservation District is delegated by the State Conservation Commission to oversee Pennsylvania's Nutrient Management Act (Act 38) in York County.

Active plans on file:

- 31 current Act 38 Nutrient Management Plans (NMP) are on file in York County.
- 12 are on file for Concentrated Animal Operations (CAOs) in York County.
- 12 are regulated as Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFOs) and CAOs.
- Two plans are for Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFOs) only (not a CAO).
- An additional, five plans are for Volunteer Animal Operations (VAOs). These operations are not required by Act 38 regulations to have an approved plan, but voluntarily choose to do so.

Annual Status Reviews:

- Under Act 38 regulations all CAOs are required to have an annual review conducted to determine if they are in compliance with regulations. Twenty-five Nutrient Management Plans received status reviews in 2019.
- Under Act 38 regulations, VAOs are required to have an annual status review completed every three years. No VAO operations received a status review in 2019.

NMP Plan Reviews and Approvals:


In 2019, nine Nutrient Management Plans were received for review by the District.

- Eight plans were updates for existing CAO or CAFO plans.
- One plan was for a new CAO.
- Eight Nutrient Management Plans were approved by our YCCD Board of Directors in 2019. One plan is still under review.
- One CAO operation became a VAO and the NMP was withdrawn.
- Two CAO/CAFO operations were transferred.

Educational Activities

As part of our Pennsylvania Nutrient Management and Manure Management delegated responsibilities, the District provided the following outreach and educational activities:

- Shared a Facebook post with Penn State Extension article, "The Do's and Don'ts of Importing Manure" 300 views.
- Displays with Manure and Nutrient Management Planning materials (brochures & manuals) at the following events:
 - York County Crops Day on Jan. 24th—57 attendees/25 vendors
 - York County Ag Recognition Banquet on March 29th—370 attendees
- Educational presentations at the following meetings:
 - Jefferson Sportsmen's Association meeting on January 17th—30 attendees. Presentation included CAO identifications, Act 38 and Manure Management regulations and principles.
 - York County Crops Day on January 24th with 57 producers and 25 vendors. Highlighted manure application setbacks and winter spreading regulations.
- Penn State Extension Pasture Walk on July 23rd. Presentation on manure mgmt. requirements, manual orientation and ACA mgmt.
 Twenty-one were in attendance.

Educational Activities continued

Educational presentations at the following meetings:

- York County 4-H program hosted a meeting featuring newly developed manure management curriculum for youth, "The Smelly Side of Agriculture." While 4-H members participated in hand-on activities, Michele Grove met with parents to present an overview of the Manure Management Manual and manure management principles to 25 attendees.
- York County Ag Land Preservation public meeting on December 14, with 45 attendees. Presentation included Chapter 102 & 91 regulations and what plans are required.
- A Manure Management Plan Writing Workshop was offered on March 1st with 31 farmers and one District staff member present. Staff presented manure management principles and assisted attendees with writing their Manure Management Plans in a step by step process.

- Michele Grove obtained final Nutrient Management Public Review certification. Stephen Miller also went through the training program and passed his certification exam to become provisionally certified.
- Ag staff worked with two individually certified nutrient management specialists (certified by PA to write plans for their own animal operations) to assist them in acquiring certification update credits.






Education & Communication

Our annual Seedling Sale marked it's 45th year in 2019.

Sales this year totaled \$32,370 with a profit of \$11,281 from the 534 orders. The profit will be used for the District's educational programs as well as discretionary expenses. Favorites this year included Norway spruce, Eastern white pine, Fraser fir, Winterberry, Pawpaw and Dogwood. We offered a coupon on our website redeemable for a free bare-root white pine seedling. Leftover seedlings were donated to the Keep York Beautiful Program, to be planted at the City's Hope Street Garden and the Broad Street community vegetable garden, and to the York County Parks system.



Erosion & Sediment Control

PROGRAM ACCOMPLISHMENTS for Pollution Control and National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES)

With the continued boom in the economy, 2019 was another exceptionally busy year in the E&S/NPDES program. The E&S Team was comprised of Eric Jordan, Robert Fetter, Tiffany Crum, Zach Fry, Tom Smith, Robin Sharp and MaryJean Serrano. We welcomed the addition of Nicholas Hoffman – Engineering Technician I to the E&S team. We continued to administer the E&S/NPDES program at Level III of the PA Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) delegation agreement. Level III includes reviewing E&S plans; processing NPDES permits; investigating complaints; and conducting educational workshops, site inspections, and enforcement actions at the local level. Providing an active field presence to ensure that Best Management Practices were fully implemented on the ground was a top priority while beginning to implement new NPDES permit conditions and prepare for our office relocation at the end of the year.





The following is a summary of the E&S team's activities for 2019:

- Conducted 1,161 site inspections, pre-construction meetings, site meetings, plan review site visits, and status checks.
- Investigated 232 new complaints.

- Rob continued to help with District Website updates and attended meeting on making updates with new website developed by WebTek.



The Conservation District's Watershed Specialist is a resource to both the public and private sectors, providing technical, informational and organizational assistance that will improve watershed organization development and the quality and quantity of the Commonwealth's surface and groundwater resources. The focus of this work relates to watershed assessment and monitoring, procurement of funding, technical assistance, education and outreach, and the creation, implementation and coordination of work plans and strategies to restore and protect groundwater and surface water resources.

2019 Feature Accomplishment: Limekiln Alley, Wrightsville

Resource Challenge – The homes downslope of Limekiln Alley would continually flood during heavy rains. The purpose of this project was to allow rain water to infiltrate inot the subsurface and become groundwater, reducing surface runoff, municipal infrastructure, maintenance and cost. The total project value: \$85,287.05; Grant amount: \$65,606.94; In-kind contributions: \$19,680.11. The key project partners were Wrightsville Borough and funding to complete the project was provided by the State Conservation Commission through it LVRs funding program. The grant was administered by YCCD.

- YCALPB welcomes new hire Claire O'Brien to the Agency in March to serve as Farmland Preservation Technician, replacing Eric Naylor.
- York County's Agricultural Conservation Easement Purchase Program receives State Approval for additional changes to the program guidelines from the PA Agricultural Land Preservation Board.
- York County continues to rank 3rd in Pennsylvania in terms of acres of farmland preserved through Pennsylvania's Agricultural Conservation Easement Purchase Program.
- Since program establishment in 1989, the York County Agricultural Land Preservation Board has preserved 284 farms, covering 43,284 acres of productive farmland through easement purchase.
- Since 2012, the County of York has received the donation of 5 conservation easements covering 244 acres, through the County of York Conservation Easement Donation Program, administered by the YCALPB.
- The County Board saw 48 easement applications totaling 5,118.5 acres, offered for farmland preservation. Of the total, 37 qualifying applications, covering 4,073.5 acres were scored and ranked. An additional 29 inquiries, on an estimated 1,866 acres, requested program information.
- The York County Agricultural Land Preservation Board selected 2 farms for preservation on an estimated 499 acres.
- Staff conducted inspection visits on 203 farms, covering 28,013 acres of productive farmland.
- Ag Land Preservation staff continued work with Land Use Planning and Conservation Partners to develop a Land Preservation/Protection Strategy. The workgroup developed a survey with York College to gauge support of York residents for continued land preservation efforts. The successful results prompted York County Commissioners to approve a dedicated funding stream for land preservation efforts. Continued on next page.

- Collaborated with Land Preservation/Protection Partners to prepare a Resolution for County Commissioner approval establishing the York County Land Protection Committee on November 20, 2019.
- Continued monthly mapping updates to the York County Ag Viewer layer for agricultural conservation easements and agricultural security areas.
- The York County Agricultural Land Preservation Program's conservation requirements contributed to additional conservation planning efforts on 38 tracts of working farmland, covering 4,085 acres.
- Participation with the County WIP efforts to assist with water quality efforts in the Bay Watershed.
- The York County Board of Commissioners certified \$277,320 for farmland preservation, resulting in a \$1,445,626 match from the State for local preservation efforts.

U.S.D.A. York Field Team Report

- NRCS and Conservation District employees wrote or updated 309 plans on 11,671 acres of land in York County in FY 2019.
- The York Field Team implemented conservation practices that benefited environmental quality on approximately 7998 acres.
- Obligated \$1.15 million in 15 new contracts through the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) and Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP)
- Certified 71 contracted items accounting for 25 different practices in 2019. Total incentive money paid to the Farm Bill Program participants totaled over \$274,000.
- Enrolled six new Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) contracts totaling over \$148,000 on 826 acres.
- Funded and started the implementation of three Emergency Watershed Protection Program (EWP) projects to stabilize streambanks where the stream moved within 50 ft of the houses due to the flooding events of 2018.
- Partnered with Pheasants Forever to hire a biologist, Julia Smith, to assist with the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) and other wildlife planning needs.
- Hired new Civil Engineering Technician (CET), Gary Ballina, and a new Soil Conservation Technician (SCT), Sally Barnes, to assist landowners in implementing structural practices.

The United States Department of Agriculture's York Farm Service Agency (FSA) works to equitably serve all farmers, ranchers, and agricultural partners through the delivery of effective, efficient agricultural programs for all Americans. Agency efforts include facilitating income support, disaster assistance and conservation programs, providing operating loans for the procurement of farm equipment, seed and fertilizer, as well as offering ownership loans to help new and veteran producers purchase a farm.

This last year was extremely busy for FSA as we continued to implement the 2018 Farm Bill, along with trade and disaster programs. The Market Facilitation Program (MFP) was implemented this year to assist farmers and ranchers impacted by tariffs and the loss of traditional export markets. York County FSA issued approximately 900 payments for 2018 and 2019, totaling nearly \$9,000,000 so far.

York County FSA has nearly 3,400 producers associated with over 5,000 farms. We accepted acreage reports on approximately 160,000 acres consisting of over 20,000 individual fields.

Over 400 York County producers on approximately 2,800 farms are eligible for the Price Loss Coverage (PLC) and Agricultural Risk Coverage (ARC) programs. These help protect producers when there are either price or revenue losses. In October, we issued approximately 500 payments for crop year 2018 losses. We are currently accepting enrollment for the 2019 and 2020 crop years.

The Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) continues to be important to protecting our environmentally sensitive land and we have roughly 200 contracts for CRP and CREP, consisting of over 2,100 acres generating annual rental payments totaling nearly \$500,000. Additionally, we provided thousands in cost-share and incentive payments for the installation of long term resource conserving covers, much of which was matched by Pennsylvania's Department of Agriculture.

Our Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) can be an important tool for producers of non-insurable crops to protect against natural disasters. Coverage levels range from 50 to 65 percent of production, in 5 percent increments, at 55 or 100 percent of the average market price. This year the program provided coverage to several fruit and vegetable growers who were affected by abnormal freezing or drought.

York County producers who participated in our 2019 Marketing Assistance Loans (MAL) have received nearly 3.1 million dollars to allow for more flexibility on when to market their crops. Producers can also take advantage of our many other programs: Dairy Margin Coverage Program (DMC), Farm Storage Facility Loans (FSFL), Wildfires and Hurricanes Indemnity Program (WHIP), Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP), and the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-Raised Fish (ELAP) to name a few.

All of us here in the York County FSA office look forward to continuing to provide exceptional service to the farmers and ranchers of York County.


