



### 2022 FEATURED ACCOMPLISHMENT: Trout Run Exelon Habitat Improvement Program Project

•Resource Challenge – Trout Run was experiencing bank instability, loss of habitat, and lacked a significant riparian buffer.

•Project Summary and Results – The project consisted of approximately 400 linear feet of stream work including the installation of mudsills and root wads to provide habitat, a riparian buffer planting, and a stabilized stream crossing.

·Total Project Value: \$74,500.00



The YHSA Tsugoose Canadensis placed 1st in the Senior High York County Envirothon and continued on to place 6th in the PA Envirothon.





# AG LAND PRESERVATION ERIC NAYLOR, DIRECTOR

The past year has been both eventful and successful for the York County Agricultural Land Preservation Board and Staff.

The York County Board of Commissioners allocated \$2,007,222 for 2022 easement purchases and the State Department of Agriculture allocated \$2,814,812, bringing York's 2022 total easement purchase funds to \$4,822,034. In February, we received 56 easement applications for the 2022 - 2023 application round. Of those 56 applications, 40 were found to meet the qualification requirements and were ranked. The YCALPB selected the highest ranking 14 applications for preservation and staff continues to work toward easement settlements for those applications. Our office now utilizes a 24-month application window. In Spring of 2023, the board will select the highest-ranking farms from the 26 applications that were not selected in 2022.

In 2022, our office hosted two Soil Health Luncheons as part of a \$10,000 AFT Soil Health grant. The main objective of this grant was to educate and spread the word of the importance of soil health. Utilizing these grant funds, we hosted one soil health luncheon in Airville, one soil health luncheon at the 4H Center in Stoverstown, and plan to host a luncheon this Spring in northern York County.

This past year, Staff inspected 154 easements to ensure that easement provisions are being observed. We are required to inspect most easements every other year and we inspect Federally Funded easements and donated easements each year. Farms with conservation concerns or other issues can be inspected more often, as needed, to ensure compliance with program requirements. Our office was also able to preserve 13 farms totaling 1,212.77 acres in ten different municipalities in York County in 2022.

On November 15th, 2022, the YCALPB said goodbye and wished a happy retirement to longtime director, Patty McCandless. Patty was instrumental in the success of the YCALP Program over the past 32 years, as she was involved in the preservation of all 321 farms preserved through our program. Formally a Farmland Preservation Technician and, more recently, Assistant Director, Eric Naylor has been promoted as Director following Patty's retirement.

Since program establishment in 1989, the York County Agricultural Land Preservation Board has preserved 321 easements covering 46,442.68 acres of productive farmland through easement purchase and donation. York County continues to rank 3rd in Pennsylvania for farmland acres preserved through Pennsylvania's Agricultural Conservation Easement Purchase Program.

# **OUR PARTNERS**

NRCS Worked to secure **Emergency Watershed** Protection Program (EWP) sponsorship with the Watershed Alliance of York (WAY) and secured Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) funding for two properties in danger due to the September 2021 flooding event. The total funding for the project was \$181,000. One of the projects was completed in 2022 and the other will be completed in early 2023.

# **USDA NRCS**

#### ERIC SAMUS, DISTRICT CONSERVATIONIST

• NRCS and Conservation District employees wrote 76 Conservation Plans in York County in Fiscal Year 2022

• Obligated \$880,000 in 11 contracts through the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) and Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) covering approximately 1328 acres

• Certified 147 contracted items accounting for 31 different practices in 2022 through RCPP and EQIP programs. Total incentive money paid to the Farm Bill Program participants totaled over \$652,000. Improved Soil and Water Resources on over 2400 acres of land in York County.

• Certified and processed over \$306,000 in payments under the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) with enhancements and practices on over 6399 acres

Some of the agency's efforts include facilitating income support, disaster assistance and conservation programs, providing operating loans for the procurement of farm equipment, seed and fertilizer, as well as offering ownership loans to help new and veteran producers purchase a farm."

# **USDA FARM SERVICE AGENCY (FSA)**



### RICHARD CSUTORAS, COUNTY EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

#### News and Accomplishments:

• FSA implemented the Emergency Relief Program for producers who were impacted by eligible disasters in 2020 and 2021. \$685,789 has been issued to York producers so far and stay tuned for another phase of the program coming later this year.

• York Producers benefited from additional disaster programs including the Spot Market Hog Pandemic Program (SMHPP), the Tree Assistance Program (TAP), and the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP). Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP), and the Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-Raised Fish (ELAP) are also available.

• 2153 farms enrolled the Price Loss Coverage (PLC) and Agricultural Risk Coverage (ARC) programs. These help protect producers when there are either price or revenue losses. We are currently accepting enrollment for the 2023 crop year.

• The Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) continues to be important to protecting our environmentally sensitive land and we have roughly 200 contracts for CRP and CREP, consisting of over 2,100 acres generating annual rental payments totaling approximately \$533,000.

• Nearly \$3,000,000 in 2022 Marketing Assistance Loans (MAL) were made to allow producers more flexibility on when to market their crops.

• Acreage reporting is always busy and in 2022 we accepted acreage reports on approximately 175,000 acres consisting of over 21,000 individual fields. We always encourage producers to avoid the rush by reporting early!

• Our Farm Loan staff provides Direct and Guaranteed Farm Ownership loans and Operating loans and assisted over 50 producers this year in York County who may have had difficulty receiving credit through traditional lenders. York County producers who participated in our 2022 Marketing Assistance Loans (MAL) have received over 3.3 million dollars to allow for more flexibility on when to market their crops.

• Producers also took advantage of our many other programs, including the Dairy Margin Coverage (DMC), Organic Certification Cost Share (OCCSP), and Organic and Transitional Education and Certification Program (OTECP).

• All of us here in the York County FSA office look forward to continuing to provide exceptional service to the farmers and ranchers of York County.
